



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS BEGINNER

What age does the Grapevine Studies Bible Beginner curriculum cover?

We have designed the Beginner books for ages 5 to 7, however students younger, who have good motor skills can easily use this book.

For what grade level was the Beginner books designed?

Pre-kindergarten and Kindergarten.

Can I teach children younger than 5 years old?

Yes, if they have a desire to learn. If they can draw basic shapes such as circles, straight lines, triangles, and can sit at a table, focused for fifteen minutes they can start with the Beginner book. We highly recommend trying a sample lesson on your student to determine their ability to use this book.

What supplies do I need to teach the Beginner books?

Student Supply List: Bible, Grapevine Studies student book, and colored pencils.

Teacher Supply List: Bible, Grapevine Studies Teacher book, dry erase board & markers (8 colors), and Bible dictionary.

If we are just starting to teach the curriculum do we start with the Beginner level?

No, levels are written based on ages, not knowledge. Begin at or above the recommended age level. We also recommend beginning with the Old Testament Overview.

Will I miss anything if I start with an older level?

No, with each level we cover the same basic information; adding more Scripture reading, memorization, and study skills to each level. For example we add basic Bible geography in Level 3 and the use of study books in Levels 4 and 5.

Can I teach multiple ages with this curriculum?

No, the Beginner books are not compatible with Levels 1 to 4.

What teacher manual do I need?

The Beginner teacher manual that matches the student book.

What is the difference between Beginner and Level 1?

The Beginners program focuses on the main accounts of the Bible. In Level 1, students are introduced to the Bible timeline and continue to learn about the major characters and events of the Bible. Beginners draw two drawings per page while Level 1 students draw four drawings per page.



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My student does not read, will this prevent them from using this curriculum?

No, teachers can read the written information to the student without hindering learning. The reviews for each lesson were designed to be done verbally.

What is the difference between the color and black/white teacher editions?

The content is exactly the same. The color teacher's manual contains the stick figures and lesson notes in color instead of black and white. Teachers who are visual learners may prefer the color version.
