The Lessons

Day 1 and 2

Students will read Bible passages, take notes, and create titles for each Scripture section. While reading, students will choose words to look up in a Bible Dictionary, Concordance, and Topical Bible. Students will select and begin working on one of the activities and research projects listed on page three of the lesson.

Day 3

Students will answer review questions for the lesson. Students should continue working on their activity and research projects if time allows.

Day 4

Students will complete their activity and research projects for the lesson.

Day 5

Students are encouraged to discuss with other believers what they have learned throughout the week.
